With 790 proposals submitted and only 162 proposals approved, you are one of five than made it through




Results ERASMUS-EDU-2023-CBHE Call for proposals



CBHE - Number of selected projects in R2






- A stronger link and cooperation with the private sector, promoting innovation and entrepreneurship;

Project monitoring key steps


- Monitor that the action is implemented properly
- Report on the progress of the action (e.g. deliverables, milestones, outputs/outcomes, critical risks, indicators, etc; if any)
- COMMUNICATION, DISSEMINATION AND VISIBILITY
 - Communicating your project & Acknowledgement of EU funding
 - Dissemination & exploitation of project results
 - Communication with the granting authority





Project monitoring

- Continuous reporting module
- Periodic reporting module



Reporting

On behalf of the project consortium, the **project coordinator submits all reports**, **payment requests**, **proof of deliverables and other documents through the grant management service**. You can access the service through your profile in the Funding & tenders Portal.



Continuous Reporting, Periodic Reporting and outputs

- Continuous Reporting Module (periodic uploading of results)
- Periodic Reporting Module (linked to payment)
- Communication
- Work Packages (WP)
- Deliverables (DEL) & other tabs
- Critical Risks



Continuous Reporting – From a legal viewpoint

During the project, you are expected to provide regular updates on the status of the project: the continuous reporting. The beneficiaries must continuously report on the progress of the action (Art.21.1)

The continuous reporting includes:

- progress in achieving milestones
- deliverables
- updates to the publishable summary
- response to critical risks or Unforeseen Risks
- programme-specific monitoring information



Communication and Role of the Project Coordinator

- The coordinator must act as the **intermediary** for all communications between the consortium and the granting authority (Art.7)
- Request and review any documents or information required and verify their quality and completeness before passing them on to the granting authority.
 The information provided must be accurate, precise and complete and in the format requested, including electronic format (Art.19.1)
- Submit the deliverables and reports to the granting authority
- The **beneficiaries** must immediately inform the granting authority (and the other beneficiaries) of any **events** which are likely to affect or delay the implementation of the action



Work Packages

- The action grant takes the form of a lump sum grant for the completion of work packages (Art.5.1, 6.1, 6.2);
- Annex 2 contains the estimated eligible contributions for the action (lump sum contributions), broken down by participant and work package (Art.5.4);

• Amendments for transfers between work packages (Art 5.5) are possible only

<u>if</u>

- ➤ the work packages concerned are not already completed (and declared in a financial statement)
- ➤ the transfers are justified by the technical implementation of the action

Amendments to the Grant Agreement Art.39

- In some cases, it might be necessary to amend your grant agreement, for example, if changes are needed for a successful project implementation. In these cases, the project coordinator submits a request through the Funding & tender portal's grant management service. Both the beneficiaries and the Agency sign the amendment electronically.
- In the Funding & tenders online manual, you will find an <u>overview of when</u> and how you can request an amendment.
